According to the club bylaws, Election of Board and Vacancies, Section 2, A person must be a member in good standing consenting to fulfill the duties as an Officer or Trustee as set forth in these Bylaws to be nominated for or hold office in the WCW. Nominations must be delivered in writing to the Board of Directors by their regular March meeting. The nomination shall include a statement of commitment to serve signed by the candidate and the support of at least two other members.

WASHINGTON STATE BOWHUNTERS WORKING FOR THE FUTURE OF BOWHUNTING

To: COMMISSION FOR WASHINGTON STATE FISH AND WILDLIFE Washington State Bowhunters is strongly opposed to a petition filed by a person named Rocky Ross aimed at the elimination of baiting for deer and elk in our State.

COMMISSION ACTION IN 2015: Prior to 2015 baiting for deer and elk was not restricted in our State. However, the issue of baiting for deer and elk was addressed by the commission in 2015. At that time the complaint was that in some areas of our State truck loads of apples were being used as bait. This was viewed as being excessive by some people. The end result was that the commission reduced baiting to a 10 gallon limit. Further, no baits were to be placed within 200 yards of each other. This was a major blow to hunters.

PETITION: The petition filed by Rocky Ross would totally eliminate baiting for deer and elk under the guise that it would delay the onset of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) and would retard the transmission of the disease. What the petition fails to state is that there is NO CWD IN THE STATE OF WASHINGTON. Further it is a fallacy that the elimination of baiting would delay the start of CWD in our state. That is simply not true.

HUNTERS ARE NOT THE PROBLEM: Has the commission considered the fact that WDFW feeds thousands of deer and elk in it's feed lots? If CWD comes into our State should WDFW be prevented from feeding these animals? What about the great numbers of private citizens who feed deer and elk on their land, even in cities and towns? How would we stop them from doing so? What about the alfalfa fields, the corn fields, the apple orchards, the blackberry patches etc. How are these going to be regulated if CWD comes into our state? Would farmers have to stop growing their crops? How would this be enforced? These activities probably concentrate more animals than 10 gallons of apples. Does it make sense to think that the use of 10 gallons (two buckets) of apples would have much of an impact on the animals even if CWD was present in our State?

CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE IS A NATURAL PHENOMENON

As mentioned earlier there is no CWD in the State of Washington. It appears that CWD has just occurred in nature. Apparently there is no known cure for CWD. Importantly, not every animal in a herd will contract CWD. Hopefully, the various wildlife departments can come up with a cure and not simply put the onus on hunters by eliminating the limited baiting we still have.

HUNTING IS A TIME HONORED SPORT

Hunting a God given right which originated from the beginning of time when hunters harvested game to feed their families. Even today most hunters want to put meat on the table for their families. For bowhunters, baiting is an opportunity to get a close range shot with a limited range implement. This gives more of an expectation of a clean kill. As some of your may know, most of the deer and elk are nocturnal and feed at night. If a person is lucky he or she might see an animal the first hour after sunrise and the last hour before sunset. Many hours are spent in tree stands and/or ground blinds without seeing a single deer or elk. Further, baiting allows older hunters to still be able to hunt even though they cannot navigate the woods like they could when they were younger. Also, what about our youth? Baiting would allow them the opportunity to perhaps see an animal at closer range.

THE PETITION LOOKS LIKE AN ANTI HUNTING PLOY: There is no valid reason to even give the petition any consideration. It is premature because there is no CWD in Washington. Why not leave hunters alone. Let us enjoy the limited baiting we have in our State. Why must we be the brunt of those who do not like us to hunt?

Status Quo: Let hunters continue to have the baiting which the commission established in 2015, a 10 gallon limit. This seems to be working even though it is limited.

Notes from the committee reports that were presented during the board meeting are below.

Archery report:

Manager's Report:

Robert Haverstock presented.

Renters are continuing to use the facility. Robert mentioned the water shutoff valve will be replaced in the Spring after it stops freezing.

The Continental Shoot will be this Sunday (2/6). The maintenance team completed several electrical updates at the range. We are looking into a new bell or siren system because our bells are starting to wear out.

Our security cameras are having some issues and need to be fixed. Our camera person will be in next week to fix it.

Treasurer's Report:

John Woolley presented.

Nothing significant was reported. We continue to look good.

Trustees Report:

Larry Mallory presented.

No Trustee report was presented.

Old Business:

We had a brief discussion on Range 3. John Sutton provided an update. John received two bids for the footing and wall construction. One was around \$35k and the other was greater than \$60k. Mike W. is still interested in building our new baffles. His original estimate was \$46k for 21 baffles. We are waiting for an updated price. Dale suggested we look at steel baffles. This is something Dale saw at the SHOT Show. Martin will ask the booth suppliers how much steel baffles would cost and how much they would charge to install them. Martin will also find out how tall the baffles need to be if we install retrievers.

Next, we discussed the senior discount. Scott Ray shared things he was hearing from senior members. Scott suggested we consider adding a grandfather clause and maybe putting out requests for donations. We decided we will not change anything at this time. Then, we discussed the initiation fee. We had a brief discussion and decided we will not change anything at this time.

Dale provided a marketing update. He provided a summary of what we talked about last week in the marketing meeting and what Dale saw at the Shot Show. Dave Bowerman and Jeff Gomes will be taking pictures at the Continental Shoot to post on our website and use for other purposes.

Joe talked about the need of getting the hunting and fishing committee functioning. We have a potential candidate to lead this. Robert will be talking to the candidate this week and will get back to us. John Sutton talked about getting handrails. They will cost about \$500. John will get these purchased and installed.

Robert commented on collateral logo replacement. He will work on purging our old collateral. As he orders new collateral, he will be using the new logo. Robert mentioned that both the Bobcat and forklift are fixed.

Next, we discussed the member's question regarding if we have to pay taxes on our dues. Members do have to pay taxes on dues but not the complete dues. 56% of our dues are non-taxable based on being a gun range membership and 44% are subject to sales tax due to taxable services provided. This is accounted for in the amount we have to pay. John Woolley investigated how much the senior discount costs the club. It is \$29,987.50 per year. An update was provided to the online waiver to state members cannot train for money without talking to the board and receiving board approval.

New Business:

Do we want to do something this year to give a bio on people running for board member positions? Joe said we do want to do that. Joe will have a form added to the newsletter. The bios need to be in the March Newsletter. If a candidate wants their bio in the March newsletter, they need to submit the content to WCW by March 20th.

Dale suggested we start sending members notification about legislation affecting our members. We should not take sides but provide the information to our membership so they can comment as they feel appropriate. The board is okay with this if it is unbiased.

The bikes to the women's shelter will be delivered on February 4th.

We discussed if we should allow the WAC to have small gun shows at WCW? If so, someone should contact Richard Ripley. The board is okay with this. Martin Morehouse will contact Richard to say we are open to it if they are interested.

We discussed needing to add an item to the Policy/ New Member Orientation Manual stating people cannot train for money without board approval Martin said he will get the information from John Woolley and add it to the manual.

Joe brought up the idea of hosting axe throwing. We had a brief discussion.

Shotgun committee had a discussion regarding the automated trappers. The people at the meeting did not like the idea. So, we will not pursue this. Scott Ray mentioned we should start mentioning donations in the newsletter again. John Woolley will start providing this information to Martin to include in the newsletter.

Clay pigeon prices have gone up. We will need to raise our prices. We will only raise the price of the clays.

Martin Morehouse mentioned the Appleseed Project is still planning their 'long range' Appleseed event for August 20th and 21st.

The Civil Air Patrol would also like to plan an Appleseed event on 30 April 30th through May 1st in the clubhouse.

A smallbore position match is now on the calendar for the third Saturday of each month, April through September on Range 1, organized by Brian Lapinski. Brian Wilson has proposed a quarterly smallbore benchrest 100/200-yard match. The board is fine with this.
