President's Message

When watching the news I often hear the word conflation used usually to describe some position of disparaging conflict regarding a political position. I might add this isn't exclusive to one party or another. Sometimes I find this confusion used in a manner that is not only wrong but also somewhat destructive.

Let me give you an example. The other day, I was sitting in the shotgun clubhouse bemoaning the fact that the donation bin for our charity to the Domestic Violence Services of Snohomish County was completely empty. When I sat down at the coffee table to express my dismay about the lack of charitable contribution, I was greeted with a downright expression of what I call misdirected lack of empathy. I simply stated that I was disappointed at the lack of contribution to this very worthy cause. One of the individuals at the table made a statement to the effect that he did not contribute to people who don't work and are lazy. I asked him what that had to do with domestic violence victims. He looked at me like I was an idiot who couldn't understand his position. There was a flash point of anger that took over me but fortunately many years of overreacting and having to face the consequences of allowing myself to act out stopped me from reacting. I simply removed myself from the situation. Maybe there is some better sense that comes with maturity.

My point here is that I believe that this fellow was conflating people that are in very sad, often overwhelming, situations with people who are lazy or unwilling to help themselves. I have

come to know the Domestic Violence Services of Snohomish County quite well in the past several years. One time when I visited them with some donated things from our club, I observed a little boy approximately eight years old with a substantial black eye also known as a shiner on his cheek. I causally asked one of the case workers how he got said bruise? I assumed it was from rough play with some other kids who were living in this temporary housing shelter. She replied in quite matter of fact manner "no it was a gift from his father." I for one do not conflate this type of cruelty to a lack of work ethic.

With that said, let me get to the point. I would love to see those food and toy bins overflowing with goods. I do not think it is terribly difficult to grab a can of food or buy a toy or two when you are at the store. I know many people are stressed with financial difficulties these days, but this is not going to put anybody in the poor house. By the time most members read this newsletter we'll have less than ten days to respond to this need. It's still time to donate. This range promotes friendly competition. I think I should have put out the challenge to each committee chairman to rally their respective activity. I could envision shotgun vs. archery vs. rifle vs. pistol all competing to collect the most amount of food and toys for this worthy cause. I feel like I am guilt tripping you all and maybe I am, but I also believe it resounds a larger message to the community at large.

When I took over as president of this club, I was listening to both the members of the

shooting community as well as the general public. Whenever I mention my association with a gun club I get a varied reaction and sometimes it is not particularly favorable. Let's face it folks we live in an anti-gun area of the country to a great extent. In fact it is hard to often understand because it flies in the face of increased gun sales in general. I believe that the one sure way of keeping a sense of credibility with people who are anti-gun is by challenging the stereotype images some may have of gun owners. I happen to know that gestures of good will can in a very real way subconsciously help us maintain a positive image in the community.

If you think I am embellishing this just to promote this Toy and Food drive let me end this rant with an example of what I am trying to express. I know one of our board members who

has two children and is very active at the range. She told me that when a neighbor found out her family was active at the club the neighbors no longer allowed their children to be at this board member's house. I guess in a very real way this exhibits a degree of close mindedness that law abiding gun owners face. I believe when we reach out to the greater community, we help dispel these often erroneous notions. So, let me conclude by wishing everyone a very Happy Holiday Season.

If indeed it is better to give than receive let's get to it.

Keep those muzzles down range.

NOVEMBER 2023 ARA CLUB TOURNAMENT REPORT

Saturday Nov 25th we held the first ARA club tournament at WCW Shooting Sports (formerly Kenmore) with 14 participants evenly split between Factory and Unlimited Class

While we had a calm day wind-wise, it was literally freezing . At 9am, the recorded temperature in the range was 30F , and the surface temperature of the benches was 19F !! Yes I measured it !!

This also presented the first opportunity for us to shoot 6 targets back-to-back in one day. I am glad to report that thanks to the diligence of our competitors and volunteers, we finished shooting at 11:45ish and scoring by 12:30ish... just amazing team work from everyone involved.

Speaking of volunteers, this was our 11th match of the year, and this match wouldn't have worked with the hard work of Kevin Kellogg, Matthew Daly, and Brian Lapinski . We celebrated them as critical members of our crew that made this event a success this year!

Factory Class was very competitive, as it was all year. The top 3 were separated by 200-400 points, or 8 shots across all six targets , with each of the top 3 scoring a 2500 perfect score at least once, and each winning at least one target. The overall 1st place and winner of the Factory Class was David Konkle with an exceptional average of 2466.67 and three 2500s! 2nd place went to Frank Tevis who averaged 2433, and 3rd place went to Keith Wilson with an average 2412. Keith scored the highest card not only of the day in Factory but also all year with an amazing 2500 4x!

Unlimited Class was fun, but frankly had an undisputed winner with Harvey Waldron III winning ALL six targets and finishing the day with an average of 2350! 2nd place went to TAQ and 3rd place went to Mark Huber.

Guest topics:

Michael Parent presented.
Michael wanted to bring up a topic based on a recent seminar he attended. He attended the National Shooting Sports Foundation seminar. He wanted to share what he learned and make sure we are doing things correctly. He shared requirements for FFLs and Responsible Parties (RPs). He mentioned the only people who can access our firearms are the RPs and our employees who have had background checks. Patty said it can also be agents of the club. An agent can be a volunteer. As a result of the conversion, we will do the following:

- Patty will look into if the volunteers need to be background checked.
- We will need to make sure employees are properly background checked.
- Dave L. mentioned we should make a list of all agents and have the agents sign a

paper stating they understand their responsibilities.

- We will look to add another RP to our FFL.

Committee reports:

Notes from the committee reports that were presented during the board meeting are below.

Archery report:

Gabe Shank presented.

The wood table in the clubhouse is going away.

We are also throwing away the deer heads.

Erin Mickelberry painted the container. She did a good job. We still have extra paint if we want to use it on something else.

Targets from Washington Bow Hunters

Association have showed up. We got a lot of value out of them. We received over \$5,000 worth of targets and also received as a donation for \$1000.

Gabe also looked into the cost of bows. \$1500 would get us 10 bows. They would likely be less than that because he believes we will be able to get a discount through some of our connections. Gabe recommends we use the youth account because the bows will be for youth.

Because the old bows may be seen as antique items, a member is looking to see if we could sell the old bows, and he will give us the proceeds. At the WSSA convention, we won four of the five bids we submitted for tournaments. Washington State will manage everything in three of the events and we run the rest.

If enough people come to our events, we will qualify for up to \$10,000 through Snohomish County. Recreational Tax Fund grant.

He found some volunteers to help clear the area around the pond.

Handgun Report:

Dave Rusko presented.

New member orientation classes are scheduled through the end of the year. 16 new members attended new member orientation in October. Dave said he has heard from people that they would donate to us if we were a 501c3. Joe said he will check on the status of our filing.

The flat panel display is assembled and stored in the clubhouse. Still need to finish cleaning out the clubhouse storage area.

Dave is working with Robert on developing a plan on what to charge for using the steel target. Robert and Dave will bring the proposal to the board when they are ready.

Dave asked if people could use a holster as their carrying case. We discussed and the board said we must require the firearm to be unloaded and the holster be off the body when the firearm is inserted into the holster. The board said this is okay.

Dave asked if we are still looking into using crossbows. Gabe said he is still looking into it.

Dave said there are a lot of members interested in this.

They are going to post information asking people to make sure they are having good groupings at 15 yards before they move out to 25 yards.

Shooters must be able to shoot groups with all rounds in the black at 15 yards before they start shooting at 25 yards.

Dave asked why open carry is not allowed. This is the policy of the club.

Dave said the committee would like to remove the caliber and position requirement for special use. Members would still have to take a proficiency test, but the caliber and position would not be captured and entered on their membership card.

Dave wanted to remind all members to leave the gate as you find it when you are entering and exiting.

Jeff Gomes moved to remove the caliber and position restriction as Dave described. Aaron Morales seconded. Passed.

Rifle Report:

Martin Morehouse presented.

Rifle fundamentals is scheduled for November 19th. If works well, he will offer it to the public too.

Project Appleseed asked for several more events in 2024. Martin said there are no conflicts so he will put them on the calendar.

Legal Heat asked to conduct more classes in 2024. Someone asked if they were paying for the use of our facility. Martin said no. The board said they are okay with the schedule, but they need to start paying for the facility per the schedule Peter put together. Martin will reach out and tell them we approve the schedule if they are willing to pay the facility rental fee.

Junior Rifle Inland Empire practice would like to use our facility.

Martin said they would like to purchase some steel targets for rifle. They will get the targets from ShootingTargets7. They will be \$245.64. The board said that is okay.

Martin said we should stop using Steve Reads Zoom account. We will not need it.

Dave Levinson suggested we put something in the newsletter thanking Steve for all he has done for the range. We will do this.

Shotgun Report:

Joe Rinaldi presented.

There were a couple incidents in shotgun they are looking into. We need to make sure our members and visitors are following our policies and rules.

Continental league will be happening again.

The trap fundamentals classes have been full.

Thanks to Patty and John Woolley, the youth program is going.

Members night has not been well attended lately.

This is likely due to the weather.

Manager's Report:

Robert Haverstock presented.

They finished the employee reviews. We will be updating our closure time starting this Sunday.

We will open at 9am and be closing at 4pm.

Treasurer's Report:

Joe Maggiora presented.

We are still losing money monthly, but we have improved slightly. Our average monthly loss is \$13,000 instead of \$17,000.

We discussed our employees' compensation and the impact to our annual expenses. Dave Levinson moved to approve employee compensation as we had discussed. John Sutton seconded. Passed.

Joe Maggiora suggested we raise fees and dues. His proposal is to raise all fees except for youth fees. He proposed dues and fees are increased 8% starting January 1st. We will provide a grace period until the end of January. We discussed the proposal. Dale Sieg moved to increase dues by 8%. Joe Rinaldi seconded. Passed. Patty suggested if we increase our public rates that we revisit in a couple months to see if the increase of rates causes the public income to come down.

The board all agreed they will do this. Martin Morehouse moved we raise daily rates by 6%. Joe Maggiora seconded. Passed. Passed. This was not unanimous.

Dave Levinson had Joe Maggiora ran the numbers without the renters and that shows a bit of an improvement.

Trustees Report:

John Sutton presented.

John mentioned we already discussed many of the topics they discussed in their last meeting.

Dave Levinson mentioned they talked to MT2 (lead reclaiming. They will be coming out to do estimates. We will get 40% of the profits.

Dave Levinson will talk to Kevin about his proposed IT contract and state we did not have time to review it this month. We will review it next month.

Dave Levinson shared a presentation about transitioning to Zply Fiber from Comcast. We will have two networks. There will be a guest wifi and there will be a network for our employees and board members. Martin moved we adopt the Zply proposal as presented. Scott Ray seconded. Passed.

Marketing Report:

Peter Goodwin presented.

Peter presented everything he has accomplished since he started working for the range. He also listed several events our club put together that he used to leverage for social media and marketing. Some things worked and some things did not work. Below is a list of items he mentioned:

- 1) Improved appearance of range.
- 2) Improvements around the range
 - a. Steel targets
 - b. Approved silhouette targets
 - c. Archery range improvements.
- 3) New range signage.
- 4) Adopt-a-Road litter program. He mentioned this is helping cement our relationship with our community.
- 5) He captured photography and video assets from all the events we have had.
- 6) 3D archery event which was great.
- 7) Summer shotgun BBQ and Fun Shoot.

- 8) Wind Doping presentation. Out of this came a request to do a rifle practical event.
- 9) Started pistol night.
- 10) Started Youth Shotgun League
- 11) Corporate Event: Mortenson Construction
- 12) He created a price list for our facility we could share with potential customers.
- 13) Free range pass program. Only 13 coupons were redeemed. We will need to revisit this.
- 14) WAC Gun Show. We created a banner and poster to use at this and future events.
- 15) New no initiation fee promotion has started.
- 16) Securite Gun Club collaboration. We are still working on a proposal.
- 17) Ducks Unlimited Seattle Event.
- 18) Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation Event.
- 19) Newsletter redesign.
- 20) We have streamlined the New Membership Orientation program.
- 21) Shotgun Clubhouse remodeling.
- 22) Law Enforcement outreach.
- 23) Event evaluation surveys at the end of each event.

Peter asked if he could get a view of 2023 results. Looking for year over year data. For example, number of new members, number public visitors, facility rental sales and other sales.

He said we need to start working on expectations and what we want to accomplish for 2024.

He mentioned we need to look at refreshing the website. We can use the same person who volunteered to help with updating the newsletter design.

We need to create some video assets. This is going to take time and money.

We need to continue our commitment to social media content.

We need to move forward with our \$5000 grant from Next Step Archery. Peter needs assistance from the archery team. Peter said he would draft a proposal and share it with Aaron. Aaron will provide feedback.

Peter suggested we hire an event coordinator. Jeff Gomes said he would help talk to law enforcement. Jeff said he needs the video and other collateral to share with them. Peter said he would get together with Jeff and share what he has shown them, and they can work from there.

Martin said he has a lot of events planned for 2024. Gabe and Aaron also have several archery events planned. Dale said we need to make sure there are still weekend opportunities on Range 1 for members to simply use the range. Some members cannot come during the week. Joe mentioned someone reached out to him about the hunting/fishing committee lead. He wants to conduct hunting/fishing training programs. Joe will be meeting with him. We should conduct another family day. Joe said he would also like to provide the Domestic Violence Services of Snohomish County with food and toys for Christmas. He will reach out to them to discuss this.
