Recently we were saddened to learn that Mark Silver passed away on February 27th of this year. For those of you who didn't know Mark, he was the acting Club Operations Manager here at WCW from the latter half of 2016 until his retirement in 2020. He moved to Idaho in 2022 and Robert Haverstock was promoted to replace him. He was an avid Shotgunner and headed up our Youth Shotgun League for several years. Mark developed the lesson plan and worked with Dave Levinson and Larry Mallory to give our kids a rich experience they will no doubt carry through life. Mark also took his interest as an expert BBQ chef very seriously actively participating as a contestant and later, as a Judge, for many regional competitions.

During Mark's time at WCW he also outlined and formalized the business structure our Employees follow to this day. He conducted regular weekly meetings, created the Employees Handbook and defined the policies and procedures for L&I and other State and Local regulatory agencies. Perhaps his most unexpected, yet significantly impactful, contribution to our Club was when he negotiated the contract for our Renters shortly before the Covid shutdown period. The significant revenue the agreement generated not only sustained us during a perilous business period but ensured our Club would come through that challenging time in a stronger, more secure, financial position. To say he had a positive impact on WCW and our members, is truly an understatement.

On a more uplifting note, we are planning to celebrate our 80th Anniversary as a Shooting Sports Club on August 17th from 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM. In addition to posting this event on our Club Calendar, we will be sending e-mail messages to all active members and placing flyers at each range. Be sure to mark your personal calendar and make plans to join us for this family-centric Picnic celebration!

Our Board assignments and responsibilities are now complete and we, as a body, are moving forward with a host of new projects and events related to each shooting discipline. Here is a brief overview of who's who in the zoo:

Our new Bylaws spell out the new business structure as dictated by our 501(c) (3) non-profit status. The Committees are as follows: Governance, Finance, Audit, Teller, Shooting Sports Advisory, and Conduct. Members are encouraged to participate in all our committee assignments. Each committee plays a key role in the management of Club business and how we function as a body. There are several openings the Board needs to fill with willing members who can dedicate a small amount of their time to

accomplishing the tasks required. The By Laws are available on our Website and I encourage you to take a few minutes to familiarize yourself with the rules that govern our club. MAY 2025 BENCHREST CENTERFIRE MATCH REPORT

Board Topics of discussion:

MRP Tactical delivery of firearms to WCW Shooting Sports may potentially expose WCW to a legal violation post 31-June 2025 due to enacted FFL law. Michael Parent is seeking legal counsel to affirm requirements.

NSA Agreement. 25% of all coaching revenue comes back to WCW on the honor system. Board president has requested a signed agreement with NSA stipulating all agreements on training and revenue. Gabe Shank recommended that

they send a monthly report of the trainers and shooters and a payment for the coaching. Committee Chairs will complete staffing their committees over the next few months and begin reviewing policies specific to their committee for inclusion into the WCW policies manual. Each committee chair will determine the right size for their committee and when each committee will be meeting to comply with the adopted bylaws and their requirements. Dave Rusko advised that Snohomish County rejected the amended permit application for the rebuilding of the Range office deck and stairs. The county is asking for additional documentation on the construction methodologies being used to rebuild the deck. Our architect is again revising the drawings to accommodate the counties' request. The permit is still pending issuance until the application is approved by the county. Treasurer Joe Maggiora advised that the Finance and Audit Committees are stood up and have established a quarterly committee meeting schedule.

Committee reports:

Archery report:

June 7-8 is going to be a busy day with two archery tourneys being held on the same day. One on the FITA Field and the other on the Walk-Through Course. Flyers have been posted throughout the facility with details. We expect over 100 people to attend the two tourneys. Be ready for the parking which we will have several attendants helping out.

New hay target bales have been placed on the lower walk-through course. Bring lube for your arrows as the hay bales are real tight and your arrows may get stuck.

We are hosting the WSAA 3D State Championship on August 2-3. Anyone can compete in this tournament. It will be 30 targets each day at set marked distances. You can shoot one or two days, the only restriction is that the tourney starts at 9am!

Handgun Report: Pistol

Special Use report.

- 1. Pistol range steel targets temporarily removed from range as spall from jacketed rounds destroyed the 25-yard uprights on lanes 1-4. Relocation of steel target frames being considered.
- 2. Unaimed shots continue to plague the pistol range. Severe damage to wood covering the steel I-Beam supports is evident across the pistol range. If you see someone not on paper, give them a hand correcting the issue.
- 3. 23 competitors have begun the 2025 Spring/Summer Bullseye League every Thursday evening on the Pistol Range.

Range request

Greensleeves 4H Archery wants to plan a junior archery event in the clubhouse for 1 June. They have a member who is a WCW member who can be the lead for this, will get back to us with more detail. Mortenson will to hold another event for 20-25 people at shotgun on 13 August. We put it on the schedule.

Safety or Maintenance Concerns?

Our lead reclamation session in the clubhouse on 6 May went well, completing half of the traps. We plan another session on 10 June, starting at 9 AM, and can use a few more volunteers. Jeff McGee/Non-Ferrous Metals, Inc has offered to melt, cast, and package the recovered clubhouse lead for us, for no charge once it is cleaned out. Rifle Committee Work Party schedule Other

We are looking at a member proposal to allow appropriate muzzleloaders to shoot beyond 100 yards on Range 1, such as those with better and heavier bullets. Round ball or unrifled muzzleloaders would likely still be limited to 100 yards. Measured the distance above the sightline on Range 1 at 50 yards, for the 300 and 200 yard targets, from both the bench and the platform. From the bench, the 50-yard baffle is 24" above

the 200 yard sightline, and 21 inches above the 300 yard sightline. From the platform, the 50-yard baffle is 36" above the 200 yard sightline, and 33" above the 300 yard sightline. A Whitworth, .45-70, or similar rifle should rise about 9" above the line of sight at 50 yards if shooting at 200 yards, or 17" if shooting at 300 yards.

We are looking at a Know Your Limits steel target set for rimfire use on Range 1.

A member has proposed reduced membership for members who live out of state? We are trying to determine how to specify the limits on this.
