# Personal Note

In 2005 I joined WCW after a long hiatus from shooting. Like many of you, making a living and a variety of other excuses kept me away from my sport. My primary interest was shotgun shooting and members provided lots of good information and guidance on what equipment I would need to become more adept in the sport. My old Remington 1100 12 GA is still a great gun but not really designed for high volume clay busting. Even with the best equipment it's easy to slip back into bad habits and create some new ones. When that happens, a member is always willing to step up and help me break the negative cycle to get back on target. Soon after my first year, at the encouragement of my shotgun peers, I started shooting competitively. They told me the best way to improve my skill level was to compete and, sure enough, it had a very positive effect. When I had an equipment issue (read, broken or ill-fitting gun) I was helped directly by a member or pointed to a source that could correct the problem. When members informed me of an opportunity to get a great deal on some quality shotgun reloading equipment I jumped at the chance and now enjoy making my own custom loads for the various games. The experience of regularly shooting with members eventually transcended shotgun and led me into Handgun shooting. Once again, a member invited me to the Pistol Range to try his new Kimber 1911 45 and soon after I was shooting my own. Since then, many more makes and calibers have followed. For me, these disciplines complement each other and are both extremely satisfying pursuits. As you might expect, a fellow member helped me get started reloading handgun ammunition a few years ago so I get to enjoy that aspect of the sport as well. These experiences along with new friends, new shooting partners and team companionship are only a few of the benefits I've enjoyed as a WCW member these past 20 years. Since we all share the same passion its likely you are, or will soon be, experiencing the same level of joy and gratification in your own shooting sport(s). If, for any reason you are not, please let us (the members and governing body) know so we can help you find your sweet spot in our wonderful sport.

# SHOTGUN REPORT

Our Shotgun Range has been experiencing some great shooting. The Monday night 5-Stand League organized by Tim Lade was a great success. We had over 30 competitors who shot for a best 5 out of 7 nights scores. The results <u>are here</u>, or on the website under 'Events-Match Schedules-Match and League Results-5-Stand results'.

We will be having Members Night on Mondays from 5-9pm through the end of August. This is a perfect time come have some fun shooting clays for \$5.00 a round. If there is enough interest, we can discuss extending it later into Fall. Our third Monday night will continue to be a Shotgun Committee Meeting night. Those who have ideas, suggestions, complaints or anything else about the Shotgun Range, can shoot and then bring this up. We are trying to make improvements that benefit the members and their families as well as the public shooters.

We opened up the Members night to all Mondays during the League, instead of just the first and third Mondays. This has been quite a success, as members had more opportunities to shoot. Along with more hours, came more variety. We had members who had attended the Phil Kiner Clinic, but had not had the chance to shoot handicap or Handicap or Doubles due to a strong focus on fundamentals during the class. It was suggested that we do some Handicap shooting, along with our 16yd Trap. We started with Handicap from the 20yd line, and after getting a few rounds, started moving back. We went to 23 and then 25 yards, while progressively increasing in skills. As a bonus, going back for a round at 16yds after that, seems quite easy. We will be adding Doubles to the format and helping each other improve. With the addition of Handicap and Doubles, we will have shooters with a full Competiton Trap skillset. This will prepare our shooters for PITA, ATA or local club shoots. Anyone who is interested in practicing with others who are casually shooting and helping each other, will find the members nights are quite fun.

As competition goes, we had members shooting at the WSPITA State Championships. Gregory Stewart, one of our Trappers, was Champion in the Einar Johanson Window and Door Handicap with 98. His sister, Meryn Stewart won the Lady Champion in the Bunn Championship Doubles event, and was Runner Up in the Gustafson Championship Singles, narrowly edging out Gregory to be in the Shoot-off. An all Stewart Shoot-off would have been a perfect result. One of our regular Monday night shooters was invited to come try his hand at competition and came back excited about his first time. His first experience with Doubles has him set on improving his skills, of which he was already quite accomplished at the basic Trap skills. We are investigating improvements in the lighting on the Shotgun Range. While this is not an issue this month, as we move into the fall and winter months we will be shooting under the lights. Michael Parent Contract renewal allowed 30 Minutes for WCW introduction and background followed by Michael's concerns about our Contractual requirements (Note: background related to our mutual arrangements including legal costs and income to the Club will be provided prior to the meeting.

Scott presented a summary of the contract considerations and requirements for the partnership with FRP Tactical and the clubs liabilities.

Michael was present to discuss his thoughts and concerns with the current situation. Not happy that he doesn't have a contract in place. Feels like the club doesn't want him here and he is upset.

He has been here since 2022. Rent figure is not \$2200 in rent payments. July payment is \$500. He is trying to provide a service to the club. Saves the club a lot of money.

Michael feels like he has converted public customers to members. He is wondering where the club feels that they are subsidizing his business but he disagrees.

He does not believe that there is a liability on the club's behalf for him doing business on the club property. HB2118 does not have any impact on what MRP does on this property.

Scott disagreed with Michael's assessment that the club does not want him here. Scott is not happy with their negotiations and made that known.

Scott Ralson reviewed the original lease document with minimal changes. Michael does not believe he was negotiated with. He believes that this is a board decision.

The club has put some money into the building that MRP is using. Michael has put in 400 hours of lease-hold improvements to the building. Michael did not get the legal document from McLean law firm in June. He has not had time to review it but will review it over the weekend and make a proposal on Monday.

John Sutton mentioned that he thought it was nice to hear the revenue figures and transfer figures. John also reminded Michael that the club does have to consider the 80 acre property for any possible liability.

Michael is not understanding the liability issue. Scott indicated that the club's attorney has made the recommendation that the club does NOT accept packages on behalf of MRP Tactical. Scott Ralston indicates the club cannot be an agent for MRP Tactical. Scott Ralston struck the language regarding the agent for reception packages.

Scott believes three areas to be addressed. Utilities, package handling, storage facilities. MRP didn't like the language of how the lease terms were listed. MRP felt there was an issue with that. MRP wants confirmation on charges for electricity. Additional \$100 annual for parcel handling fee.

MRP indicates that the liability issue could lead to him no longer doing business here at the club. Michael mentioned that he did not state what the club does in the swap meet is not a gun show as the previous minutes stated. Previous minutes reflected only partially what the conversation stated. The actual transfer of firearms is handled by an FFL and not between members during the swap meet.

A question was raised about how we identified a lawyer to cover these issues. The lawyer is a personal injury lawyer and not advertised as a firearms lawyer.

Some of the earlier conversations with the legal team, according to Scott Ray, was that the club's legal team recommended that MRP Tactical get their own legal representation and come back with his contract requirements and assumptions backed up by a legal firm.

Scott indicated that MRP has had plenty of time to get the contract done but is only just now bringing the issues to the club.

General conversation with board members that we might consider moving forward with the contract without the package handling clauses. This might effectively kill MRP's business here. The board will make changes to the contract to strike the additional electricity costs and leave in package handling on the contract. Scott will discuss one more time with legal counsel.

We updated the Range I rules to allow rifled muzzleloaders to shoot beyond 100 yards on Range I. Round ball or unrifled muzzleloaders will still be limited to 100 yards. We still need to update the large range use posters mounted on the shooting bay divider walls to include this change.

We added a Know Your Limits steel target set for rimfire use on Range 1. The rimfire group will work up a process for their use.

# **Shotgun Report:**

June has been an exciting time for the Shotgun Range. We have been having good weather and can shoot all evening as the sun is setting after 9pm.

We have the 5-Stand League taking off on Monday nights with about 30 shooters. It is going well, and there is talk of a fall league if we can improve the lighting over the field. The introduction of full colored clays for the traps that toss clays where the bottom is the most seen part will also help with this.

During the 5-Stand League, we will be having Members Night on the shotgun Range for all Mondays. As members, we can shoot those nights from 5pm-9pm, or when shooters decide we are done. Monday is still Members day until 5pm, with regular prices. After 5pm, the cost is \$5.00 per line, and the shooting is ran by the members. It is a casual atmosphere and we shoot 16yd and Handicap on Trap 2. We also have Trap 3 set up for Continental. We have seen an increase in Handicap shooting, from beyond the 16 yd line, up to the 27yd line or "The Fence" as it is known in competition. This is a great practice for the

Waterfowl shooters who want to practice for the upcoming season.

We are experiencing great results with the NRA First Steps Shotgun Class. Wayne Clapper, Dave Rusko and several other instructors are making this great starting experience for new shooters. These classes along with the NRA Basic Shotgun Class are always filled quickly, so I suggest anyone who would be interested, should sign up early. These classes are instructor based, and then Mentors go out with the students to assist them to put the classroom teaching into actual shooting skills. We are asking any of our shotgun shooters who would like to mentor for a couple hours, should reach out and we can tell you more.

The Trap Fundamentals class is also a great success. They regularly fill quickly, and our instructors are doing great at helping shooters improve their shotgun skills. This is a great class to take if you are looking to improve your trap shooting skills and is a perfect follow up for those who have taken the NRA First Steps Shotgun Class, and want to develop their skills further. Continental is a challenging and enjoyable game. I was talking to a couple members about having a Fundamentals of Continental Class. They have indicated that they would be willing to do this. It would be similar to our Shotgun Fundamentals, and be a skills improvement class for shooters who want to add continental to their skillset for fun and possible Continental League involvement.

I would like to propose a Doubles fundamentals class to bring these skills to our members as well. If we can get 16yd shooters into Handicap and Doubles, we could revive the Multiplex format and have a regular competition shoot. We recently received a quote for portable traps to add to Trap 1. With the interest in 5-Stand increasing, the goal would be to put in place training 5-Stand, which would incorporate the training springs on the traps and be set up as a first steps in 5-Stand. We have had more interest, but 5-Stand appears daunting to some of the newer shooters. This would help them learn the skills to shoot it, and Trap 1 would still be available to shoot regular trap by moving the cages back. We had a very successful pair of Shotgun Clinics with Phil Kiner, a long time Krieghoff Pro Trap Instructor. We had 5 participants on Friday, June

13, and 10 for the Saturday-Sunday clinic. This is Phil's last year of touring, so it was great to be a part of it. Phil worked with the participants to improve their skills by classroom instruction, followed by video taping the shooters and analyzing their shooting. This allowed them see exactly what was causing them to miss shots and then go out and make the changes. Everyone improved, and several came out on the following Monday to practice what they had learned. There is talk of a trip top Wyoming to have a clinic with Phil at his local club next year. Everyone left happy and with improved skills. I will be looking at other instructors for the coming years.

Finally, we have the recurring request to improve the lighting at the range. We are in the summer months, so this isn't an issue. We need improve the lighting on the range for the fall through spring shooting. This has been a complaint from shooters who come from other clubs. Several ones have very good lighting and they are favorites of shooters for those darker days. We have good hours to shoot, but when both clubs are open, they travel the distance to shoot under the lights there. In particular, a club well north of us is the Friday night 5-stand and trap location of choice. We should consider this as necessary upgrade. Some of us will be trekking up there to see their setup and see what we could do to make a similar experience. Our location, central to the major population areas, should make us the first choice for shooting. All we have to do is make the accommodations to suit the shooters.
